Chairman's Statement

As we enter into one of the most important chapters in the port's history, I have been frequently reflecting on the vast changes in our world since we first 'broke ground' at South Harbour in 2016.

The business has grown through monumental, global challenges: a pandemic, fluctuating oil prices, Brexit, the huge shift in energy production and consumption, and economic hurdles.

However, as we all know, with challenge and change comes opportunity, and while the port has not escaped the effects of these challenges, we have maintained our recovery.

In 2021, our core of revenue remained unaffected, increasing turnover by 1.5% to £33.5 million, while experiencing solid vessel arrival and cargo tonnage figures, as well as a 73% increase in ferry passenger numbers, compared to the record low of 2020.

This would not have been possible without our hard-working employees, who have shown a spirit of enthusiasm, dedication, and resilience every day. Our business will go through significant change in 2022 and 2023, and it is both refreshing and inspiring to see all our team members approach the changes head on.

The progress at our South Harbour expansion site has been remarkable; the reason the site looks different every time I visit is down to the unwavering commitment to all those working on the project, and I would like to thank our AHEP team and contractors for their constant hard work.

My thanks go to our Board members who have led the business through another year. I take this opportunity to welcome

Kenneth Shand to the Board: his experience compliments that of the rest of the Board and we look forward to working with him. Our Vice-Chair of three years, Morag McNeill, has completed her tenure with the Board and I would like to thank her for her loyal and dedicated service during her years with us. Roy Buchan stepped into the role of Vice Chair at the start of 2022, and I wish him all the best as he continues to support the business.

Our new CEO, Bob Sanguinetti, joined the Port of Aberdeen in September 2021, and he has certainly 'hit the ground running'. I look forward to seeing him lead and shape the business in the coming years.

Lastly, my greatest thanks go to our customers, port users and stakeholders across the private and public sectors. Their loyalty and support for our ambitious plans have been critical to the success of the port and will be even more important in the future.

The year ahead will be one of the most remarkable in our 900-year history, as we finally become the largest berthage port in Scotland, ready to support transition to a sustainable energy industry and international trade. The transformation our business will go through will not be without its challenges, but I have no doubt that all those involved in our operations – from the Board Room to the quaysides and everywhere in between – will be advocates for positive change and prosperity in the North East of Scotland and the rest of the country.

CEO's Statement

Aberdeen is on the cusp of significant change and – as it has been for the last 900 years – the city's port will be right at the heart of it.

The changing energy landscape has gathered even more momentum in the last 12 months and the large-scale development of renewable energy represents the biggest opportunity for sustainable economic growth in Scotland for a generation.

However, the focus and determination to ensure the city can maximise the benefits from the global energy transition comes as the country continues to recover from the long-term effects of the pandemic, and as the oil and gas industry adapts into one which is sustainable for future use.

The opportunities for the expanded port in Aberdeen are vast and transformational, and I am very proud of some key achievements which will ensure we are integral to the energy transition in Scotland. In November, during COP26, we were one of the first UK ports to sign the Operation Zero bid to accelerate the decarbonisation of North Sea operations and maintenance vessels by 2025. We announced a collaboration with bp to reduce emissions at the port through reducing vessel emissions and providing low carbon power supplies. Together with Connected Places Catapult, we received £400,000 from the Department for Transport to fund a demonstration project to provide shore power within North Harbour.

These achievements, combined with our continued exploration of the opportunities associated with the ScotWind offshore wind farms, will ensure the Port of Aberdeen and the surrounding area maintains its position as the energy capital of Europe.

I would like to thank everyone for their warm welcome to Aberdeen since my arrival in September 2021. I am greatly looking forward to continuing our work together over the coming years, as we build on what we offer our customers and port users, and as we play our part in Scotland's development.



At the Heart of the Energy Transition

Scotland is on the brink of change again, and like the past 900 years, the port will be central to the future prosperity of the region and the country.

Aberdeen is perfectly located to be Europe's energy transition capital, and our £400 million expansion project will be at the heart of the development of high potential sectors, including offshore wind and green hydrogen.

The expanded port has been designed to accommodate larger, wider, and deeper vessels, and incorporates considerable heavy-lift, flexible laydown space and expansive project areas, making it an ideal port for the full lifecycle of an offshore windfarm – from survey and assessment to operation and maintenance, and decommissioning and recommissioning.

The port's ideal location brings customers and their supply chains closer to their offshore project; couple this with the extensive and experienced supply chain on the port's doorstep, and you have the perfect combination in Aberdeen: capacity, location, and expertise.

The port in Aberdeen has been at the forefront of change before, and we are doing it again now. We are looking forward to working with our stakeholders to pull together our expertise, and ultimately bring prosperity to the North East of Scotland and the wider maritime and energy industry.

The Green Port of Aberdeen

Our activities to reduce carbon emissions in Aberdeen and further afield stretch well beyond our multi-million-pound, world class infrastructure.

Our detailed analysis of port activities shows that 78% of CO_2 emissions in the port come from vessels berthed alongside the quays. As such, we are working closely with our customers, port users and a variety of industry organisations to lead the drive for clean maritime at the port.

A green port requires innovative thinking and practices and with our partners in the public and private sectors, we will continue exploring opportunities, including quayside electrification, the use of alternative fuels and lower carbon power supplies and sustainable waste management.

We are looking forward to working with our stakeholders to pull together our expertise and ultimately bring prosperity to the North East of Scotland and the wider maritime and energy industry.

We are gearing up for operations at Aberdeen South Harbour, with the first commercial vessels expected this summer as a 'soft start' prior to operations fully commencing in October. The expanded port will be a critical asset in the future of Scotland's industries, providing customers and port users with scalable, flexible infrastructure, making it ideal for space-intense industries such as offshore wind, decommissioning, cargo, and cruise.
